For me, it is a place of connections. As a family we carve out this precious holiday time, when I can be fully present with my husband, son and our wee doggy as well. We recharge our batteries by taking a break from other parts of life and connecting with each other. I feel really close to my Mum in Berneray because it was a place she loved too. I feel connected to our extended family with whom we get to share quality time. With so many memories made there, it is a place where I feel connected to the past as well as the present with a view to the future. I feel close to God there and I love worshipping there, as it shows the real breadth of worship across the Church of Scotland. You get it – I love it there!



There's so much we do in the church that is about connections and relationships. I put a big emphasis on us being a church family, because over the years, the church has been a place where I have found belonging when I was away from my family. 
There's a lot going on in November...

Janet's Jottings The Power of Hope

Recently in our Wednesday morning 'Musings', we discussed 'hope'. We wondered how folks caught up in the wars in the Middle East can retain any hope whatsoever. We, who do not have bombs raining down on us, cannot begin to understand what they, or others in Ukraine, or wars elsewhere, are



going through and how their hopes must be dashed on a daily basis. November is a time for contemplation with the commemoration of Armistice Day. A time when we remember folks lost fighting in past wars, for the sake of their country; people who, in their efforts, *hoped* to change the world.

We think of all our service men and women who went off to war full of hope that it would be over quickly. Their loved ones waited at home, simultaneously hoping and praying they would return safely. We know the people named on our WW1 war memorials were full of hope, as they were convinced that it was the war to end all wars. Even the songs that they sang, such as 'Pack up your troubles in your old kit bag and smile, smile, smile..' or 'Keep the home fires burning' reflected hope and boosted morale. Similarly, in WW2 'We'll meet again' or 'There'll be bluebirds over the white cliffs of Dover...' offered a sense of hope that all would be well and peace would return one day soon. I wonder if they had known, that less than a lifetime later, the world would still be at war, if they would have lost all hope, determination and courage to complete their campaign?

Despite being a very small word, hope holds such a lot of meaning. Desmond Tutu said "Hope is being able to see that there is light, despite all of the darkness". Dostoevsky stated that "to live without hope is to cease to live" and Helen Keller, who was blind deaf and unable to talk, who, once enabled to communicate, expressed that "Hope sees the invisible, feels the intangible and achieves the impossible". Anne Frank felt that "where there was hope, there was life".

It seems to me that hope is commonly used to mean a wish: its strength reflects the strength of the person's desire. In the Bible, hope is often described as the confident expectation of what God has promised. "For I know the plans I have for you, declares the Lord, plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future". *Jeremiah 29 v 11*

On Remembrance Day as we think of those who never came home, we owe it to all those lost in previous battles, or caught up in present ones, never to lose hope. Therefore, I leave you with the words of Albert Einstein, who encouraged folks to "Learn from yesterday, live for today and hope for tomorrow."
